By now some of you will have heard the exciting news about our latest arrival in the RCAF Memorial Air Park. Through the kind cooperation of the Canada Aviation and Space Museum in Ottawa, we have been chosen as the museum site to have on permanent exhibit the last remaining Boeing 720 in North America. The aircraft, C-FETB was acquired by the Ottawa museum earlier this spring through an agreement with Pratt and Whitney Canada (PWC) of Longueuil, Quebec.

It has been used by PWC for the last 25 years as an engine test bed for a wide variety of PWC engines that have been produced by the company. When I first heard about this aircraft, I became aware that PWC wanted the aircraft to remain in Canada when it retired from operations in late 2010. The obvious location for display was the museum in Ottawa however as the aircraft would be flying to the museum site, and the runway at

parking spot on the airport ramp into its final resting place adjacent to our CC 130 Hercules. Finally we are starting the process of finding

the storage space necessary to clear out of the

Main Exhibit Hall (MEH) by 1 October so that the final construction phase can be completed. This process has necessitated the decision to reschedule the AD ASTRA ceremony to the last Saturday in August (25 August 2012), vice September. As previously noted the MEH will be closed to public viewing on Tuesday 4 September 2012 and will reopen when construction is completed around 1 April 2013. During this period the museum gallery will remain open as well as the gift shop and Air Park (weather permitting). 
Goodbye NAFMC

As many of the museum associates already know, I accepted the Curator position with the RCR Museum in London, ON (Royal Canadian Regiment). It is with mixed feelings that I part with the National Air Force Museum of Canada and, especially with all museum friends who offered unconditional support through my 6-year tenure. These were most successful years, with many lessons learned, hard work, and outstanding achievements in the area of collections management, exhibit development and education programs; altogether a wealth of experience that will always stay with me, wonderful and dedicated people that I shall never forget. While looking forward to building on the existing experience, I choose to think of this move as "good bye" rather than "farewell".

The last six months saw two important steps in the area of collections management: the transfer of the museum's reference library to the Canadian Forces Warfare and Aerospace Centre (CFWAC) at 8 Wing CFB Trenton along with the final phase of the 5-year collections management plan whereby the last batch of backlog donations is to be properly assessed.

The first of the projects is the result of a positive working relationship with the CFWAC, where an Air Force library was established, in a state-of-the-art

facility with adequate audio-visual equipment and furniture. The second one was in the curatorial office plans for a long time. Assessment of the museum backlog donations will lead to significant improvements for our ability not only to properly store and preserve the artifacts, but also to give public access to the entire collection (which is currently limited to the artifacts on display through the museum). It is our intention to set up a collections database available on-line, easy to access for all interested parties. The information provided will be limited to a number of basic fields, such as title and category of the artefact, brief description and dates. The project is in a very early stage and as it progresses, more information will be provided.

NEW AQUISITIONS

S/L Andy MacKenzie DFC, CD and Korean War POW Cartoons

Earlier this winter, the museum acquired a significant collection in provenance of the late Squadron Leader Andrew Robert MacKenzie (1920-2009). In addition to his renown as a fighter pilot ace during the Second World War, S/L MacKenzie is distinguished by his status as the RCAF's only POW of the Korean War.

MacKenzie was born on 10 August 1920 in Montreal. He attended West Hill High School, where he excelled at sports and enjoyed popularity amongst his peers. Despite a steady job with the Montreal Gazette he enlisted in the RCAF on 3 April 1940, eager to realize his boyhood dream of becoming a pilot. He graduated No. 1 ITS (Toronto) with the rank of LAC and was posted to No. 4 EFTS (Windsor Mills) on 21 July 1940. Andy's first solo flight was in a Fleet Finch on 5 August 1940. He completed No. 31 SFTS (Kingston, ON) on 30 December 1941 and was promoted to the rank of Sergeant.

Once he had earned his wings, MacKenzie was eager to join the fight overseas. This was not to happen for another two years however, as MacKenzie's excellent grades and flying skills recommended him for instructor duties on the home front. (Sgt) MacKenzie attended Flying Instructors Course No. 30 at Central Flying School (Trenton), and then went on to instruct at No. 11 SFTS and CFS Trenton. He was promoted to WO2 on 30 December 1941, commissioned as Pilot Officer on 31 March 1942, and then moved to instruct at No. 16 SFTS.

In early 1943, MacKenzie got his wish and was posted overseas with 421 Squadron. Here he met George "Buzz" Beurling, with whom he became close friends. It was with 421 Squadron that F/O MacKenzie was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, effective 15 January 1944 (Supplement to the *London Gazette*, 25 January 1944, p. 482). The citation for the award describes MacKenzie as "a skilful and, resolute fighter, whose determination to destroy the enemy has always been evident." MacKenzie was promoted to the rank of Flight Lieutenant on 31 March 1944, and served with 403 Squadron from May through August of that year.

(F/L) MacKenzie was flying his 403 Squadron Spitfire over Utah beach in the early days after D-Day when he was shot down by American anti-aircraft fire. He was transferred back to Canada in late 1944, to the reserves in 1945, and then to the Special Reserves in April of 1946. In October 1946, MacKenzie transferred back to the Regular Force.

During the next few peacetime years, MacKenzie broadened his skill set and took several postings across Canada. He completed training in air force administration and flying control, then served as a controller, Link training instructor, and as Executive Assistant to the commander of Air Defence Group, Group Captain "Iron Bill" MacBrien. It was in this position that MacKenzie was promoted to the rank of Squadron Leader on 1 January 1951.

S/L MacKenzie was appointed officer commanding 441 Squadron on 1 March 1951, a position held until 6 November 1952. Andy converted from the Vampire to the Sabre at this time, an experience he later recalled as "quite a thrill." He volunteered for service in Korea, and was seconded to the USAF, flying with the 39th Fighter Interceptor Squadron (51st Fighter Interceptor Wing).

On his 5th mission (5 December 1952), S/L MacKenzie was shot down by friendly fire over North Korea. He was taken prisoner and held until 5 December 1954, two years to the day of his capture and many months after the end of the Korean War.

S/L MacKenzie was flying his Sabre F-86 in formation at 42,000 feet along the West coast of Korea, toward the Yalu River when his flight encountered a formation of about 20 MIGs. Two of the enemy aircraft dove at the group, and MacKenzie's Sabre was separated from the others. Turning tight to re-group with his flight, his aircraft lost significant speed and fell well behind. As Maj. Saunders, the flight leader engaged a second pair of MIGs, MacKenzie came under fire. His canopy was blown off, his right aileron and fuselage were hit, and the aircraft barreled out of control.

MacKenzie bailed out and pulled his chute, but lost his equipment, escape kit and identification in the fall. He was immediately intercepted by about 30 armed soldiers. Stripped of his remaining equipment, MacKenzie was blindfolded and taken into China, where his interrogation began. He was fed rice and lightly questioned; all the while reassured that he was safe and would soon go home. For the next two years, Andy suffered interrogations, freezing temperatures, prolonged solitary confinement, and months of 'bed arrest' where he was forced to sit erect and immobile all day long on the edge of his bed.

S/L MacKenzie continued his career with the RCAF after his return to Canada, including a posting as an intelligence staff officer in NORAD. His last position was Chief Administration Officer at Rockcliffe, held until his retirement in 1967.

Among the items donated by his widow, Mrs. Alison MacKenzie are Andy's uniforms, photographs, equipment, and

personal items. Especially interesting is a collection of thirteen original cartoons illustrating Andy's POW experiences. All of the cartoons were published with Andy MacKenzie's story in *Weekend Magazine*, in a four-part series in 1955. This was a popular Montreal based publication, circulated weekly between 1951 and 1977 to homes throughout Canada through a distribution arrangement that helped reaching record numbers of approx. 2.5 million (in combination with French-language sister magazine *Perspectives*).

Artist Ed McNally (1916 – 1971), created these cartoons on woven paper, with pencil, black China ink, brush and burin. He was born in Fort William, Ontario (now Thunder Bay). He got his start with The Winnipeg Free Press, and went on to work for The Montreal Star. During his 11 years at The Star, McNally received two National Newspaper Awards for his work (1961, 1964). Bestowed for excellence in editorial cartooning, these awards recognized McNally's wit, biting humour, and considerable natural talent. He is one of the artists who established a Canadian tradition of political cartoons in the 1950s, breaking with US inspired clichés accepted before.

In the instance depicted here, MacKenzie's calm silence infuriated his captors until one impatient officer stood, looked him in the eye and said, "There are much worse things than death."

Torture can be silent. S/L MacKenzie came to realize the full truth of this phrase during his months of 'bed-arrest' punishment. All day long, Andy was made to sit on the edge of his cot without moving. He could not speak, nor could he stretch his cramped limbs or doze off for a few peaceful moments. With naught but his thoughts for company, he thought of his family and friends, wondering if he would ever see them again. At this time, no one at home knew that he was alive and being held prisoner. Andy learned after the war that his mother passed away during his captivity, believing him to be dead.

Museum Tours 2011-2012

More than 175 bookings were entered in the museum records between April 2011 and May 2012, with almost 6 000 visitors.

The large majority of the bookings were for school groups, from Kindergarten level up to Gr 11 classes. The students enjoyed our newly established education programs, with instructional activities that meet educators' expectations, but also standards set by the Ontario Ministry of Education. The most popular program seems to be the Gr 6 *Prepare to Take Off*, designed to teach the physics of flight. On the 23rd of February (Canada's National Aviation Day), when the Education programs celebrated the first anniversary, a Gr 6 class from the Prince of Wales Public School (Belleville), had the opportunity to learn and experience the principles of flight.

Youth organizations, such as cadet groups are also very interested to spend time at the National Air Force Museum of Canada. In addition to the Air Cadet summer camp held at 8 Wing CFB Trenton, other squadrons from across the country came to visit from as far as Edmonton, Alberta or Quebec City, Quebec. Their interest for the historical component of our programs is to be noted.

Adults and seniors also visited the museum on a regular basis. The preferred choice for this category of visitors is the briefing/guided tour provided by the knowledgeable volunteer tour guides.

EXHIBITS

It has been sometime since our visitors were given the opportunity to step inside the museum flight simulators: CC 130 Hercules, CT 114 Tutor and CF 101 Voodoo. These flying aids have been transferred to the museum once DND ceased to use them for training purposes. The CC 130 Hercules is a model used until mid 1980s, when an updated type of simulator replaced the older models which did not allow for motion or visuals.

The CT 114 is better known as the Snowbird, Canadian aerobatic team aircraft, but both, the aircraft and simulator, were very popular pilot training tools in Moose Jaw, SK and Gimli, MB. In 2000 the simulators were discontinued by DND and offered to the military museums across the country in 2001; one of the recipients was the National Air Force Museum of Canada.

The CF system element used the CF 101 Voodoo simulator during the 1970s and up to ca. 1984 at several locations: Bagotville (QC), Chatham (NB) and Comox (BC). It served for post basic training to prepare the pilots and navigators assigned to fly the CF 101 Voodoo aircraft; in addition, all qualified aircrew would've used the simulator periodically for going over the standard and emergency take off/landing procedures.

For safety reasons, all of the museum flight simulators are in static display shape, never to function at full capacity again. However, the Flight Engineers Association, a group of retired former service members based in Quinte West, and a dedicated team of restoration volunteers, worked hard to clean, paint and replace some of the dials missing from the dashboards (or just update these instruments to current safety standards), the seats and other components that were in need of cosmetic repairs. Currently, the interior light effects are similar to what

one would see prior to starting the aircraft engines in real time situation. In addition, a flight simulator video game will be available for the public interested in trying out their pilot skills on a digital screen.

Many Canadians who served in the Air Force trained in these cockpits to become aircrew during 1960s up to mid 1980s. Some of them are now volunteering at the museum and are inviting the general public to experience the interior of the cockpits. All visitors enjoy this segment of their stopover, but one category always has a real blast: the students from Kindergarten to Gr 12.



EDUCATION


Welcome Gina Heinbockel-Bolik!
