## FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Hard to believe that we have commenced our winter hours already and yet here we are waiting for the first snowfall. Looking back over our spring and summer period we did in fact notice a small reduction in our visitor rates compared

to other years. It parallels the information that we received from the province which also shows

a downturn in cross border visits and tourism as a whole.

We did however see a marked increase in understanding school visits as our education program continof the principles ues to prosper and mature. Our newly formed education volunteer group has provided a keen and exciting start to this new museum capability. Each student leaves the museum with a renewed sense of wonder and understanding of the principles of flight and the glorious history of Canada's Air Force.

Throughout the fall and winter season we will be hard at work preparing for new exhibits and displays to entertain and amaze each and every visitor. We have just recently completed our 1942 Mark II Harvard restoration project and have the

aircraft now on prominent display near the Silver Dart. A large platform adjacent to the aircraft allows the public to have a personal, close-up view of the cockpit details, as well as the internal workings in the main fuselage. Another superb example of our talented restoration volunteers whose work continues to impress everyone. Hot on the heels of our Harvard is the Lock-

of the Reynolds Alberta Museum in Wetaskiwin Alberta. As our Hudson was missing many key parts, this Loadstar (the civilian equivalent of a Hudson) will significantly assist our restoration crew as they proceed with the rebuilding. The Loadstar was moved from Alberta by two large flatbed trucks in late October. Finally our sister T-33, tail number 133593, is together again and will be parked in formation with the other T-33 (Red Knight) in the Air Park this coming spring.



The Curatorial Office saw many changes in Summer 2011. While exhibit revisions ceased for a while, artifact acquisitions continued and collections management tools and procedures were modified. The collections management automated system was fully converted to CFAMS Version 3. This software is produced by the Directorate of History and Heritage within the DND; as a member of the Organization of Military Museums in Canada (OMMC), the NAFMC is mandated to operate under this program. The new system allows the attachment of images to artifact records, a feature that was unavailble in previous versions.

## Museum Artifacts Travel to Ottawa & England

- The Canadian War Museum solicited a loan for their current show "War and Medicine": the Guinea Pig Club Pin from the medal set awarded to S/L Frances Oaks, RCAF medical personnel. The pin was bestowed to airmen who suffered burns during the Second World War and to a few of the medical personnel involved with caring for such injuries.
- In early July 2011, a Canadian Air Forces Monument was officially unveiled at the UK's National Arboretum in Alrewas. The monument honours the Commonwealth Canadian Aviation in UK and an RCAF ceremonial sword was requested to take part in the unveiling ceremony.

## **NEW AQUISITIONS**

## **RCAF Flyers**

Highly collectible sports memorabilia was donated to the museum by Mrs Phyllis Gravelle of Trenton. She is the widow of famous hockey player Orval Gravelle (1927-1997), who was once a member of the RCAF Flyers Olympic Hockey team. The collection was donated in two parts, the first probably in 1997 and the second in December 2010. Mrs Gravelle informed us that her husband donated the RCAF Flyers hockey jersey and the Olympic Gold Medal shortly before he died. As museum paperwork was scarce in the 1990s, we can only conclude this must have happened in 1997. The majority of this memorabilia has been on display ever since.

All items in the collection belonged to Orval Gravelle. As a member of the RCAF Flyers team, he won gold at the Winter Olympic Games—St Moritz, 1948. He was number 16 on the team, but the cotton numbers have been in possession of Mrs Gravelle until this past winter.

The collection consists of ice hockey insignia and equipment: the hockey jersey (casual dress), the ice hockey gold medal, lapel pins, and participant plaques. The latter are unique items, produced by the official medalist of the 1948 Winter Olympics. This was *Huguenin Frères et Cie*, a company created in 1868 in the town of Locle, district of Neuchâtel (Switzerland). To this day, the company is a high-end supplier of medals, medallions, plaques, trophies and currencies. Along with the pins and the participant plaques, items exchanged by players also include:

a tin mug from the Czechoslovakia team and the Sweden-Canada 1948 plaque, creation of the famous Swedish artist, Carl Fagerberg (1878-1948).

During the 1948 Winter Olympic Games, the RCAF Flyers placed first in the tournament with seven wins and one tie against the team from Czechoslovakia, who also won seven games. The tournament was decided on goal differential. Team Canada outscored their opponents 69 to 5 (a +64 goal differential). The Czechoslovakia team outscored their opponents 80 to 18 (a +62 goal differential). Canada won the gold by a two-goal margin. Their last game was with Sweden.





#### W/C J.F. Hone Medal Set

Mr William Hone of Picton donated to the museum a logbook and an exceptional medal set that belonged to his father, W/C John F. Hone (1901–1976). He was one of Manitoba's first "bush-pilots", with a long career in aviation, both military and civilian. He was awarded the Air Force Cross in 1942, as approved by King George VI on the advice of His Canadian Ministers on the occasion of His Majesty's Birthday (*Third Supplement to the London Gazette*, 11 June 1942, p. 2534). In 1945, S/L Hone received a Bar to the Air Force Cross (*Supplement to the London Gazette*, 1 January 1945, p. 116).

In 1936, Hone was commended for conducting "the soundest and most efficient aircraft company operating in the Dominion of Canada". Three years later he enlisted at Camp Borden and received his pilot wings the same year. In 1940, he became an instructor for the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan and taught at the Air Navigation Schools in Trenton, Rivers, and Edmonton. By 1944 he was posted to the Photo Centre at Rockcliffe (Ottawa). He rose through the ranks from Pilot Officer to Wing Commander and in 1945 S/L John F. Hone was released, but he returned for a brief service in 1948, when he eventually received his highest rank.

W/C Hone's logbook reveals an impressive record of aircraft flown with the RCAF fleet: Harvard, Anson, Oxford, Tiger Moth, Hurricane, Crane, Bolingbrook, Catalina, Canso, Loadstar, Dakota, Fortress, etc. Even more impressive is the civilian fleet: Avro Avian (skis, wheels, and seaplane), Fokker Super (skis, seaplane), Beechcraft (wheels, seaplane), Vedette (boat), Vickers Viking (boat), Vickers Veruna (boat), Monocoupe, Junkers W/34 (skis), Sikorsky (amphibian seaplane). The entries in this logbook are dated between 1939 and 1968.


## F/Sgt Floyd B. Lummis Medal Set

Mr Doug Lummis of Inverary, ON donated a unique medal set and Second World War memorabilia in provenance of his father, F/Sgt Floyd B. Lummis (1915–2010). The medal set is unique not only for the George Medal, one of the highest gallantry awards in the British Commonwealth recognition system, but also because F/Sgt Lummis was also the first RCAF serving member to be presented with the prestigious medal, in 1942 (*Third Supplement to the London Gazette*, 11 June 1942, p. 2533).

A native of Frankford, ON, Lummis was serving at RCAF Station Trenton in December 1939. As he was draining fuel from an aircraft, a lamp broke into a petrol can and ignited. Lummis carried the burning lamp from the hangar and

thus "saved twelve aircraft, which, at that date, were invaluable to Canada's air training plan [BCATP]" (London Gazett e, op. cit). This was a very couragous act and by the time Lummis had removed the lamp to outside the hangar he was totally engulfed in flames. On 18 January 1940, W/C J.A. Sully wrote to Lummis who was in Belleville General Hospital recovering from his injuries: "I have been directed by the Air Officer Commanding, Air Training Command, to convey to you his appreciation of the action you took to control the fire in the hangar and to express his wish for an early recovery".

On 18 June 1942, A/V/M G.E. Brookes, Air Officer Commanding No. 1 Training Command, wrote congratulating F/Sgt Lummis "on being the first member of the Royal Canadian Air Force to receive this very high honour [George Medal]".

## **Camp Mirage Monument**


On July 6, 2011, a ceremony at the NAFMC was held to unveil and rededicate the Camp Mirage Monument. Previously standing in the centre of Camp Mirage, the monument is a constant reminder of the service and ultimate sacrifice made by Canadian Forces members. During the ceremony, Minister of National Defence, Peter MacKay shared his impressions of the monument in theatre: "feeling pride and a solemn sense of what was at stake. These cairns belong to all Canadians. We join as a nation to mourn loved ones."

Visitors to the museum have shown their caring and remembrance by placing poppies on the plaques of the fallen. This was a spontanious action of the public and the museum is honoured to be home to the memorial.




### **Special Guests for Museum Exhibits**


#### **Irvin Air Chute**


Maj Gen (Ret'd) James Hanna of Ottawa visited the museum on Ad Astra Day and brought with him a parachute manufactured in September 1940, by the famous Irvin Air Chute Ltd (Fort Erie, ON). This company was famous for safety equipment for aviation. Established in the USA, in 1919 by the well known inventor of the parachute, Leslie Irvin, it expanded to England, Canada and other Commonwealth countries. During the Second World War it manufactured parachutes for aircrew and airborne units on a very large scale.

### **EDUCATION**

### Reflecting On the Experiences of 2010/2011

Why do we reflect? I am a strong believer in the theory that reflection is a primary element of learning. That through reflection individuals can take control of their own learning and by practicing self-assessment skills individuals can recognize what works and what needs to be improved. Acknowledging, entrusting and incorporating this new learning may lead to positive settings with beneficial, long-term and constructive results.

What on earth is she talking about right? Please let me explain where I am going with this. On September 4th I celebrated one year as the Education Programmer in the newly developed Education Department of the NAFMC. Since this date I have found myself in deep reflection. Pondering thoughts of the year past, thoughts like... are we accomplishing what we set out to do? What could we be doing better? Are we meeting the goals and objectives of the program? What do I know now that I did not know then? Here's what I discovered during my time reflecting.

Early on, a business plan was developed which identified that recruitment of volunteer instructors was crucial to the success of this department. I am pleased to share that, at present, the museum's Education Department consists of 27 volunteer instructors, most of whom are either serving or former serving members of Canada's Air Force. Enthusiastic, energetic, and well conversant, our animators have participated in providing



instruction of our curriculum based programs to approximately 43 schools, facilitating to over 1000 students within 58 classes. Above and beyond servicing the school groups, the volunteers have welcomed over 160 pre-arranged guided or self guided tours, including of Scouts, Girl Guides, Royal Canadian Air/Army/Navy Cadets, and other community organizations.

Further reflection determined that, as a consequence of focusing on our customer service needs and the administrative requirements of establishing a new department, time did not allow for the development of all programming that was forecasted in the business plan. Although a little discouraged and frustrated with that outcome, the reality is that we were able to successfully develop six programs very well!!! As a result, the NAFMC is now able to offer educators the following programs:

**Grade 2**—The Fantastic Flight of the Silver Dart

**Grade 3**—Letters Home

Grade 6—Flight-Prepare for Take-Off

**Grade 7**—Understanding Structures and Mechanism—Form and Function

**Grade 9/10**—Canadian History since World War I–Time to Share

**Grade 11**—Transportation Technology–The Rev-olution of Engines.

Currently, a Grade 8 program is in development stages and focuses on Canada's role in the Afghanistan mission. Furthermore, it is our hope that time will allow the completion of all program requirements in the next year.

While delving deeper, looking for further answers to my questions, I found myself reading through many teacher assessments and student reflection pieces. My observation was that these evaluation pieces validated the fact that we are assisting our youth in learning the curriculum required materials along with historical information extras. We are re-enforcing what is facilitated in the classroom and therefore assisting teachers in meeting student success. The reflection pieces forwarded from students also re-affirmed that learners are benefiting from our efforts. One student quote in particular that resonates within is: "I appreciated learning how planes fly. I think I would like to become a pilot someday." More than a year ago, who would have thought that we would inspire our youth by simply incorporating Bernoulli's Principles in the museum's school programming!

As a life-long learner, another question asked was, what new knowledge have I acquired during this year-long journey and how has it made an impact on the program? Many may laugh but the first thing that came to mind was Bob Sharpe and Tom Ross, (Education Facilitators here at the NAFMC), educating me on the principles of internal combustion engines and the SUCK-SQUEEZE-BANG-BLOW theory. Those that know me well would attest this is not an area of learning any one of us could foresee. However, I am very grateful to these individuals as this information became very useful in the developing stages of our grade 11 Transportation Technology-Rev-olution of Engines course curriculum. This also was a light bulb moment in my career here at the NAFMC. This was the day that I discovered that I did not have to know it all and that those who surrounded me were willing to assist in educating me along the way.

While I contemplate the future success of the education program, one quote comes to mind. Henry Ford's "Coming together is a beginning. Keeping together is progress. Working together is success." With this in mind, I look forward to many more years of working together and creating success!


### **Dakota Aircraft Cleaning**

Early this fall, a team from 436 Sqn at 8 Wing/CFB Trenton undertook the task of cleaning the museum's Douglas Dakota CC129. The project was aimed at preventing the spread of corrosion on the metal structure, removing some of the protective gear that was obsolete and cleaning the seasonal wild life signs left from summer. The team was lead by MCpl Gordon Bennett and consisted of Cpl Tanya Logan, Cpl Simon Laurent, and Cpl Mat Caissie. The museum is very grateful and looks forward to continuing this project next spring. Below are the details of their work:

- Remove corrosion and organic dirt from entire landing gear structure, tail wheel and pedestals, refinish metal surfaces
- Remove corrosion, sand and refinish propellers and hubs on both engines, reproduced serial number and manufacturer's stenciling
- Remove corrosion, sand, and apply walkway compound on both wings
- Remove corrosion and refinish exhausts on both engines
- Refinish assorted marking stencils under the aircraft (ground, mooring, etc)



- Refinish markings on fuselage (propeller band, danger, emergency rescue, etc)
- · Manufacture and install oil cooler intake covers
- Manufacture and install Pitot tube covers
- Refinish a variety of antennas located under the nose and fuselage of the aircraft



### **Herc Swap**

On 21 July, 2011, visitors to the museum had the opportunity to watch a very unique move. CC130 Hercules, tail #130314, which had been on temporary display in the airpark, was exchanged for a permanent version. The new aircraft, tail #130313, is fully equiped and can be viewed by the public in its original flying condition.

Interior tours of the new Herc were offered to visitors during the Yellow Wings visit and on Ad Astra Day. Both were very popular with the museum guests.

## **AD ASTRA CEREMONY**

## **Large Crowd Attends 16th Annual Ad Astra Stone Dedication**

The September 24 Ad Astra Stone Dedication Ceremony attracted a big crowd to help celebrate this special occasion at the National Air Force Museum of Canada in Trenton, Ontario.

The number of stones passed the 10 000 mark in August 2011, making this a special renewal of the annual ceremony, and was the first ceremony since the name "Royal Canadian Air Force" was restored by the Canadian government earlier in the year. The event also celebrated the 72nd anniversary of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan, created in late December 1939 to train pilots and air and ground crew for the Allied forces in World War II.

Each of the stones laid in the museum's air park represents a former or currently serving member of the RCAF or a spouse of a current or former member. More information on the stones can be found on the museum's website.

Master of Ceremonies Stephen Bolton pointed out that 2011 also marks the 60th anniversary of the recruitment of women into the RCAF. Their job was to monitor input from the DEW (Distant Early Warning) Line, a series of radar stations in the far north stretching from Greenland to Alaska and designed to detect any Soviet invasion or attack from the north. This, he said, was the beginning of what would lead to all occupations in the Canadian Forces being open to women.

Colonel Sean Friday, who became the new Commander for 8 Wing/CFB Trenton in August 2011, said he was honoured to attend this ceremony. He said the BCATP was one of Canada's most important contributions to the Allied effort in World War II,

graduating more than 131 000 pilots, air crew and ground crew in less than six years, which he called "an astonishing feat".

He noted that there is currently a lot of new construction and expansion at CFB Trenton, including a new Air Mobility Centre coming in 2012.

As for the Ad Astra program itself, Col. Friday said it is something which brings past, present and future members of Canada's Air Force and their families together. He stressed the involvement of volunteers, both in this program and in the Museum, which he said houses one of the largest collections of aircraft representing Canada's aviation history. He also thanked museum Executive Director LCol (Ret'd) Chris Colton and Col (Ret'd) Cy Yarnell, who came up with the Ad Astra concept, and the many museum volunteers for preserving this country's aviation history "one stone at a time."

The ceremony was attended by many RCAF veterans and their families, Royal Canadian Legion members, Royal Canadian Air Cadets, current members of the RCAF and members of the public. The standard bearers were led in by members of the 8 Wing Pipes and Drums, and the Parade Commander was Maj (Ret'd) C.L. Thomas CD. Additional guests included Air Force Association of Canada (AFAC) President Brian Darling, AFAC Ontario Group President D. Donovan, Quinte Region AFAC Vice-President Howard Johnston and Museum Board Chairman Bob Burke.

The dedication of the Ad Astra stones placed between August 15, 2010, and August 2011 was performed by 8 Wing Chaplain Capt (Ret'd) James Craig.



## RCAF MEMORIAL FOUNDATION

The RCAF Memorial Foundation (Foundation) continues to work hard to raise funds to support the Museum and providing monies for the daily operations and maintenance of the museum. This is accomplished through memberships, donations to the Foundation, in memory donations, an annual Golf Tournament and a Charity Banquet.

by Occasions by the Bay was scrumptious, the background music provided by the 8 Wing Quartet was very nice, the items donated for auction generated a lot of bidding and the guest speaker, the Chief of the Air Staff LGen André Deschamps, provided a interesting insight into the RCAF, both the past and as it is evolving today.
